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Modern Sri Lanka Studies is a journal of contemporary work in Social Sciences in Sri Lanka. It publishes articles on current research and theoretical developments on any discipline within Social Sciences related to Sri Lanka. Authors should aim at an international audience in presenting their research. Authors should evaluate the general significance of research to date, considering practical applications where it is relevant. Articles relating to Humanities will also be considered for publication provided that they have shown their relevance and applicability to the Social Sciences. Reviews of articles published in other journals and reviews on contemporary books on Sri Lanka are also considered for publication. All articles/review articles/book reviews will be reviewed by a member of the editorial board and two outside experts in the relevant fields.

Submission: Articles are accepted for consideration on the understanding that they are not being submitted elsewhere. The language of the journal is English. Three copies of all articles/ review articles/r the book reviews should be sent to one of the two editors. Articles are reviewed anonymously and should therefore be accompanied by a separate cover page (please use the attached form to provide this information) giving details of author's name and affiliation, address for all correspondence, telephone, fax and e-mail numbers if possible. In the same form, provide the basic information about the article/review article/book review.

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Abstract: An abstract of up to 100 words should be supplied in a separate page.

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For example: '...a quality which Nisbet (1967: 153) calls "progress"'.
 Agnew points out that "there has been a project towards sociologizing spatiality to the point that space disappears" (1972a: 93).

In the reference list, they should be listed in full at the end of the article double-spaced, in alphabetical order and in the following form:

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(i.e., no quote marks round the title of the article and minimum capitalization).
